


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Time for a bit of the Ordinary

As we enter June and the weather begins to improve (hopefully), many of us are hoping for a bit of the ordinary, we are looking



forward to things getting back to a bit of normal. Certainly, the church is entering that time of the liturgical calendar called 'Ordinary Time'. We have been through the six months of special seasons and feasts marking Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Passiontide, Easter, Ascension Day, Trinity Sunday. All of these marking something of the life of our Lord Jesus Christ. Now things settle down a bit and we drop into the routine of Christian discipleship and ministry which the Church simply calls 'Ordinary'.

This period of ordinary, this year, coincides with the gradual easing of coronavirus restrictions and the population as a whole looks for a sense of normality. But what is 'normal' now? Many of our favourite high street shops have not survived the lockdown; people have switched to online retail and a good proportion of this will no doubt continue into the future; our high streets will take on a new feel. Perhaps this will be a good thing allowing more opportunity for artisan and specialist retailers to showcase their wares. Much of my early career was in independent retail and I still think that there is nothing better than the knowledge you can gain from speaking with a specialist who knows their field inside and out. Our high streets will be changed because of Covid.

And the Church is not immune either. As the world changes, so do the challenges facing the Church. Many Churches have seen their income plummet because of fewer onsite services and almost no weddings to speak of. Our own Diocese of Leicester is accelerating a process of restructuring that was just beginning at the start of the first lockdown; and what was going to take five years, will now have to be completed before the end of this current year because of financial constraints on the budget. 

Church is changing:

Accelerated by the Covid pandemic, the Diocese of Leicester, of which we are a part, is undergoing a strategic period of restructure which includes looking at our finance - how we make use of our historical assets and our current giving; our buildings - the challenge of maintaining significant numbers of historic churches; and our ministry - how clergy and other ministers are recruited, trained and deployed.

Local Conversations:

Ministry to our Church is extremely likely to change affecting the allocation of clergy here. We have been asked to give input into this change by considering three possible models of future ministry (all of which arise because of the reducing numbers of clergy in our Diocese). We are now inviting you to be a part of a Local Conversation.

How can I get involved in the Local Conversation?

We will be having two meetings: The first will be on *Saturday 5th June 10am till 12noon*, where the three Models of Ministry will be introduced. The second will be on *Saturday 12th June 10am till 12noon*, where we will be able to discuss the three models and answer questions on them. The meetings will be held online using Zoom and we would encourage those who are not able to access this technology to link up with another household (now allowed under Covid restrictions) and join the meetings in this way. In between the meetings, we would encourage you to talk with other members of the congregation to weigh the pros and cons of the different models. It is important that you attend the first meeting so you understand the proposals to be discussed at the second.

Feedback:

At the end of this process, each parish will complete a feedback form to present the results of the local conversations to the Diocese. This feedback will determine the model to be agreed by Diocesan Synod in October.

Repairs to the War Memorial


Some of you may be aware of the poor state of repair of the War Memorial.

The Church of England have put together a set of resources for us all to learn more about identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage. We, the church, are being asked to study and pray together to discern what God might be saying to the church today about these topics with an opportunity to feed back to the Church of England what we feel we discover as we learn, pray and listen together.

These topics are often perceived as difficult to talk about within the church and there is certainly some division within the wider church as people express differing attitudes and beliefs towards identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage.

The Church wants to understand what it means to follow Christ in love and faith given the questions about human identity and the variety of patterns of relationship emerging in our society, including marriage, civil partnerships, cohabitation, celibacy and friendship.

During this five week course we will hear real lived experiences from a wide variety of individuals and couples as we consider how questions about identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage fit within the bigger picture of the good news of Jesus Christ.

UPDATE TO APRIL 2021

The work of the Food Project continues to grow and develop and we are amazingly grateful to all those who support us in so many ways., A new charity called Soar Valley Outreach has been set up to oversee the work of the Soar Valley Community Food Project and Soar Valley Community Money Advice. It can also offer small relief grants.

Some of the main highlights are:-

We are blessed by fantastic donations of food and money including from churches and shops (4 Co-ops and Waitrose) where there are customer donation points.

We have provided 791 food parcels in the first 4 months of 2021 compared to just 280 in the same period in 2020 - almost triple.

We now operate through 6 centres based in churches. Rothley and Birstall have been joined by Mountsorrel, Sileby, Barrow and Syston which opened in 2020. We have Thurmaston opening this month on 7th June.

We have recently been awarded a grant to develop financial and budgeting training and to extend the debt advice service.

Our model is a "hub and spoke" where all the food is held centrally in the hub at Mountsorrel Baptist Church. Each of the centres then take orders from those who need support and the hub pick those food parcels. The centres collect the food parcels and bring their donations. Each centre can concentrate their resources on supporting those who come in for help.

This means the support for those in need is much closer to where they live and also in a church in their community. As well as providing the food parcel the churches can encourage those they support to access other resources in the church.

In addition to the food parcels we want to be able to offer more debt advice and open wellbeing cafes in each of the centres who want to do that.

Your continued support is massively appreciated and is helping some of the most vulnerable in our society. As the pandemic recedes so does the financial support the government is offering, so we expect to see an increase in the need for support.


