

I wonder, if like me, you've noticed that the shops are desperate for our cash and this year's TV Christmas advertising seemed to begin much earlier than usual with one advert even stating, "The best excuse is Christmas, it's the excuse of the year"? In that particular advert, the

retailer is advocating buying lots of presents for others while actually, rather unashamedly, treating yourself.

Well, of course, they are correct; Christmas is a great excuse for doing things a little different from the usual - and after nearly two years of living through a pandemic, we're all looking for something different - but what? Not necessarily the selfish overspending they seemed to be advocating, but still something different.

Christmas gifts, whether given generously (or sometimes reluctantly) do bring some joy; but that joy is often short lived - the batteries wear down, the novelty wears off, the clothes wear out. I sometimes wonder whether the Church should adopt some of the advertising techniques that retailers use as we seek to proclaim the Kingdom of God; but retail advertising is a desperate business and having worked in retail for twenty years, I'm not sure I want to enter that realm again. And so I will continue without the song and dance, and simply offer you some gentle encouragement to join with us this December.

Come and see us at Church. You'll find a warm welcome and the love of God revealed through his Son, Jesus Christ. Open your heart to receive the one gift that money can never buy. And, if you need an excuse It's Christmas!

IN SWITHLAND 14TH NOVEMBER 2021

This year marks the centenary of the founding of the Royal British Legion and this reminds us that the conflict of the First World War begins to slip away into history. Indeed, no-one who fought in that War is alive today.



Swithland's remembrance of those who have fallen in all wars began at 9.30am at St Leonard's Church with the Remembrance Sunday Service taken by Jeff Harrison. Jeff's address was both interesting and informative about historical events and followed the circulation throughout the village of the excellent booklet entitled 'Swithland Soldiers in the First World War' which seeks to keep alive the memory of all those local men who gave their lives for their country.

Following the service the congregation and other villagers gathered at the War Memorial for the Act of Remembrance, two minutes silence and reveille.

To close the morning, refreshments were served in the Memorial Hall.





HOME THOUGHTS FROM ABROAD



Here in Spain we are preparing for the traditional celebrations of the festive season. Huge nativities - the whole story of the life of Christ - are being put in churches and outside town halls. Families will gather for fireworks at midnight on Christmas Eve and then on January 6th the three Kings will arrive, complete with

gifts, and there will be street carnivals and fireworks into the night.

But I want to tell you about what is happening in my church which is part of the Anglican Church in Spain. It has become a 'Church of the Community' and is reaching out in many new ways.

There is a voluntary donation basket which is used to help local people. Members of the congregation can suggest those in need, or they can ask personally. There is a youth club, a mothers and toddler group, bible study and an 'open to all' choir. Carol singing will be in two local pubs and in church on Christmas Eve. At present I am receiving shoe boxes for the local orphanage, each for a particular child, and the response and enthusiasm has been heartwarming.

This church, this Christmas is a beacon, a little light of faith and hope in a world emerging from depression.
