# Extract from Swithland Parish History Publication Number 3 (2018) 'Swithland Soldiers Lost in the First World War'

"So Swithland lost three of its young sons who worked the land around here. You can imagine the devasting effect of that on such a small community... and understand why the patriotic fervour that had marked the first days of the war, eroded into a sense of futility and waste. There is a poem by Wilfred Owen, who himself died just a few days before the war ended, that captures this feeling... and speaks to the death of a country boy."

Move him into the sun Gently its touch awoke him once
At home, whispering of fields half-sown,
Always it woke him, even in France,
Until this morning and this snow,
If anything might rouse him now
The kind old sun will know.

Think how it wakes the seeds Woke once the clays of a cold star.
Are limbs, so dear achieved, are sides
Full-nerved, still warm, too hard to stir?
Was it for this the clay grew tall?
- O what made fatuous sunbeams toil
To break earth's sleep at all?



## Remembrance Sunday in Swithland 14th November 2021

As Autumn colours are blown away and the clocks are put back, it seems fitting that Remembrance Sunday comes upon us sombrely. The scary fun of Halloween gives place to the wistful reflections of All Souls ... and Advent, with its promise of Light, is still a few weeks off.



#### News from the Bell Tower

The ringers are pleased that practice has resumed on a Thursday evening at 8pm. It is good to get back to some form of normality, although most of us found it hard to remember methods that we had been ringing before lockdown.



A method is a sequence of bells which we ring to a pattern which we have learnt over the years. These sequences are rung all over the country and have been rung for more than a hundred years. Indeed, in the ringing room, there is a chart detailing a 'peal' which takes around 3hours which was rung in 1920 by members of the tower. Prior to the bells being removed from the tower in January 2019, Richard Bimson led a team of ringers from the Leicestershire Guild to ring a final peal on the bells.

We have also started ringing for the 9.30am service although Marc Wainwright has been ringing for the 8am service for a while now. We may not always have a team of 6, but we will endeavour to make it sound reasonable!

On Saturday 16th October we had a 'tower tidy' morning with the result that the ringing room looks excellent and Nick Cunningham spent around one a a half hours vacuuming the floor of the bell chamber. Thank you to all for your efforts.

#### The Power of Words

I wonder if you are a regular user of a dictionary? I read this week that almost one hundred revised and new entries and senses have been added to the Oxford English Dictionary in their October 2021 special update, including *climate crisis*, *extreme weather*, and *mass extinction*.



Words can change their meaning; and, in different contexts, can have polar opposite definitions. For example, the word 'bad' has the definition; 'of poor quality; unfavourable; adverse' as well as 'informal; good; excellent'. No wonder we sometimes get confused. Put together in a story, poem or song, words have the power to bring adventure and excitement, love and passion, fear and horror. Words can bring us to laughter as well as to tears and sometimes both at the same time.

Words can be used to leak sensitive information to the press but also to secure sensitive information in the form of passwords. There is even a daily changing password for after-hours entry to the Tower of London, used by Tower staff, residents and soldiers on duty.

We all use words in various ways. Sometimes our words are encouraging and uplifting; sometimes we use words that are hurtful and bring division. James writing to the early Christians reminds us of the importance of using our words wisely.

"Anyone who is never at fault in what they say is perfect, able to keep their whole body in check ... The tongue is a small part of the body, but it makes great boasts. ... (it) is a world of evil among the parts of the body ... It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison. With the tongue we praise our Lord and Father, and with it we curse human beings who have been made in God's likeness. Out of the same mouth come praise and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this should not be." (James 3)

As one who is equally guilty of sometimes speaking without due care, may I encourage you to think carefully about the words you use when communicating with others so that we build one another up in love.

You may like to use this verse from the psalms in prayer as you ask God for help in speaking well:

"May the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be pleasing in your sight, O Lord, my Rock, and my Redeemer." (Psalm 19.14)
