
LENT

Thoughts for Lent

I am reminded by the adverts for a certain squeezy lemon, that pancake day is upon us once more (1st March in case you've missed it) and the countdown towards Easter has begun. Of course pancake day is the day before the start of Lent when the Church enters a period of solemn preparation for



Easter. Traditionally the cries of 'Hallelujah' are silenced until we rejoice in the resurrection of Jesus Christ on Easter morning. We are encouraged to think about our lives, our lifestyle and our worship. It is a time for repentance and re-shaping of our priorities and focus.

I thought this would be a good opportunity to share with you my vision of how Church life should be so that we can journey together to make our Church just a little more Christ-like. I can sum it up in three words: Up - In - Out; but I suspect these need a little more explanation.

UP - This is to do with our relationship with God. The Upward focus reminds us to deepen our faith, to develop our discipleship, to pray, to read the Bible, to spend time studying and learning. It is as we look up towards a Holy God, that we become aware of our faults and unholiness. We say sorry and try to live lives that are more pleasing to God. In the language of our Diocesan focus, this is about developing the depth of our discipleship.

IN - This is to do with our relationship with one another. The Inward focus reminds us to develop our fellowship with other believers, to attend Church, to meet and pray with and for others in the Church family. This is where we build deep and loving friendships and nurture one another in faith. It finds its true meaning as we gather around the communion table meeting God and one another in bread and wine. In the language of our Diocesan focus, this is about developing the number of disciples.

OUT - This is to do with our relationship with the community. The Outward focus reminds us that we live as Christians within society. Recognising that we have received blessing upon blessing from God, we reach out with his love into the wider community to share something of God's blessing. We serve others without paying any attention to faith, gender, race, sexuality, (dis)ability, wealth or poverty or any other label.

In doing so, we hope that some may come to know God's love and turn to him in faith; but we continue to serve whether this happens or not. In the language of our Diocesan focus, this is about showing loving service to the world.

As you journey through Lent towards Easter, may I encourage you to consider how balanced your Christian faith is with regard to these three aspects. If we can do one thing this Lent, let it be to balance our Christian lives to give equal regard to God, one another and the wider world.

If there were a Bible passage that sums this up well, I think Acts 2.42-47 is pretty close:

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favour of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved."

ST LEONARD'S 92nd BLUEBELL SERVICE at 3pm on SUNDAY 24TH APRIL in Swithland Woods by the Great Pit



Join us for this unique celebration of the blessings of Spring. Revd Colin Resch will be taking our service with the Syston Brass Band providing the musical accompaniment.

Following the service you are invited to St Leonard's Church to share tea, coffee and cakes.

All donations will be given to the Children's Society. "The Danvers Tomb, the 18th century tomb of the last Baronet, Sir Joseph Danvers.

On his death, he expressed a wish that his dog 'Bodyguard' be buried with him, so the tomb is on the boundary of consecrated ground and the dog is with his master just outside.

Henrietta Hind died in 1900 and her sister in 1922. They left, among other things, a legacy of £200 to Swithland Church to be invested and

the income given to any needy parishioner who regularly attended church. The capital was invested in 3.5% stock producing £7 a year. Father was Churchwarden at the time and it was agreed with the Trustees that the recipient received either a bottle of whisky or a bag of coal. Eventually, the needy few died and the income had accumulated, so both the capital and income were transferred to the then Trustees of the Hind Sisters Homes in Cropston to help maintain those buildings.

The Bluebell Service has always been our special service. It was started 77 years ago by the Revd Oliver. The Rotary Club of Leicester and Friends had acquired the wood and given it to the county for public use at all times. It was just a casual word one day in 1928 when the Rector and Father walked out of church and mentioned bluebells. Why not have a service in the woods? And that is how it all began. I know that is true because I was there. Mrs Burrows played the harmonium for the first services and I played afterwards. But, eventually the Salvation Army Band supplied the music, and this year, our 75th, the Ratby Band played. To hear a brass band playing in the open is wonderful and congregations have always sung with vigour."

MOTHERING SUNDAY

4th Sunday in Lent -March 27th Service at St Leonard's at 9.30am

During the 16th century, people in the United Kingdom used to return on the 4th Sunday in

Lent for a service in their 'Mother Church', the main church or cathedral in the area. This was either the church where they were baptised or the local parish church or, more often, the nearest cathedral. Anyone who did this was commonly said to have gone 'a-mothering'.

In later times, 'Mothering Sunday' became a day when servants were given the day off to visit their Mother Church, usually with their own mothers and family members. It was often the only time they could all be together.

Children and young people were also given the day off on that date so they could visit their families and would pick wild flowers along the way and place them in the church or give them to their mothers.

Eventually the religious tradition evolved into the 'Mothering Sunday' tradition of giving gifts to mothers.

<u>MOTHERS DAY</u>

Early in the 20th century, Anna Jarvis, in the United States of America, held a memorial service in West Virginia to honour her own mother and all mothers.

In 1914 President Woodrow Wilson made a proclamation establishing the 2nd Sunday of May as the official date in the USA for the observance of a national day to celebrate mothers. This year the date will be Sunday 8th May.
