True and Faithful Service

It can't have escaped your notice that we are celebrating, as a nation and commonwealth, the Platinum Jubilee of our Queen. This remarkable achievement is something truly to be celebrated regardless of whether you are a fan of the

Royal Family or staunchly republican. Of course in most cases, 70 years of loyal service to the same employer may be considered verging into the category of employee abuse; but the Royal Family is different. Our Queen is not an employee nor is she under any obligation to continue doing what she does day after day - very few people would mind if, at the age of 95, she started taking things a bit easier.

Over the last 18 months the world of employment has seen a phenomenon taking place called 'The Great Resignation'. Record numbers of people have been quitting their jobs. The reasons for quitting or dropping out of the labour force are quite varied. They include lack of adequate childcare, low pay, concerns about Covid, burnout and fatigue. Some are quitting in search of better work opportunities, self employment or better pay.

This 'Great Resignation' has not escaped the Church either. Many clergy have quit their offices (don't worry, I'm not planning on quitting just yet) citing increased workload, lack of respect, stipends not keeping up with the cost of living and fatigue. But we have also seen 'The Great Resignation' impact the Church as volunteers re-assess their priorities and relinquish their responsibilities with no one ready or prepared to take them on. More and more tasks are then loaded onto the already overburdened clergy impacting on their levels of desire to keep going.

St Paul implores us to 'Be devoted to one another in love. Honour one another above yourselves. Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervour, serving the Lord. Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer. Share with the Lord's people who are in need. Practice hospitality'. (Romans 13.10-13)

At our Baptism, we are signed with the Cross - our badge of office - and encouraged to fight valiantly as a disciple of Christ against sin, the world and the devil, and remain faithful to Christ to the end of our lives. We are encouraged to 'shine as a light in the world to the glory of God the Father'.

Today, if you are feeling like giving up... take a moment to be renewed by God's grace; consider God's calling in your life and carry on. Unlike our Queen, we may not receive any recognition on earth for our dedicated service, but we continue serving nevertheless knowing that a greater reward awaits us: 'Well done, good and faithful servant'.



ST LEONARD'S CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL

Mini Duke & Junior Duke Award Scheme

This year pupils at school have had the opportunity to sign up to The Mini and Duke Award Scheme, which is similar to the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme. The scheme is aimed at children aged 6 to 12, and aims to give them the opportunity to 'have a go' at new and varied challenges. Through activities children develop self-confidence, independence and resilience which are good life skills and learn that sometimes you have to work at things before you succeed. The activities are exciting and different from normal school work.

There is one award per year ranging from Micro Duke, Mini Duke to Junior Duke with a bronze, silver, gold and platinum level. Each level starts in September and pupils complete activities (of their choice) and receive a certificate and badge on completion.

The activities are based on independence, exercise, presentation skills, help-fulness, being prepared, memorising information and an Eco challenge. Children choose 7 activities from 10 challenges per level, and write in journals, add photos and complete a section on self reflection. Parents can add their comments on each challenge. Children work to pre-set check point dates and bring their journals into school for review.

Here are examples of activities that some of the children have completed:

GOLD MINI DUKE

Caring for Others



Sometimes, when adults are tired, it's nice to be given a cup of tea or coffee. Your challenge is to learn how to make one safely just the way your chosen adult likes it.

Safety Points:

- * The kettle shouldn't be too heavy for you so make sure that you have just enough water in it for one cup.
- * Steam will burn you so never reach over the kettle.
- * Boiling water can burn your skin so, to avoid this, it might be wiser to put the mug on the floor rather than the worktop. That way, any spillages go on the floor rather than your skin.
- * Only fill the mug half way or it will be too hard to carry without spilling.

 Make sure you have asked how the recipient takes his/her tea or coffee e.g. strong/weak, milk, sugar?

PLATINUM JUNIOR DUKE

Trip Planning



Take control of a trip, using local public transport e.g. bus, train, etc.

It may be a journey into town to meet friends or to go shopping or to take part in or to watch a sport. The trip you plan must make use of a timetable (bus, train or other public transport). It should involve more than one mode of transport e.g. walking to the bus stop, catching the appropriate bus then knowing where to walk at the other end. A responsible adult should accompany you, but not help. His or her only role is to keep you safe.

You must have already planned the time you need to arrive and work out the details of your trip. Make sure that you are safe and never go anywhere without your parent's permission. Make a written timetable/plan of your trip to show your assessor.

Self assessment: Where did you plan to go? With whom did you travel? Which mode of transport did you use? What was the most difficult part of the process and journey? How did you feel throughout your journey? How could this challenge help you in future? How do you think you would feel if you were doing this without a parent or guardian?
