

As I sat beside the fire pit at Muddy Church at Christ Church, Mountsorrel, I found myself staring into the glowing embers, reflecting on their beauty, observing how the reds and golds flicker and change with flames dancing above and, not for the first time, I was struck with the 'wow' of God. This is what Muddy Church is all about - finding God in the natural world.

Fire is a regular feature in the Bible. In fact the word fire-s appears four hundred and sixty four times. Its use is varied, but here are some of the uses:

- \* Fire. Sometimes it is just that. A fire, for cooking or keeping warm.
- \* God's presence. God appeared to Moses from the fire of a burning bush.
- \* **Sacrifice.** Abraham was prepared to offer his son Isaac as a burnt offering in the fire. The Israelites made burnt offerings, sin offerings, fellowship offerings to God offerings made by fire.
- \* **Guidance.** God guided the Israelites through the desert with a pillar of cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night.
- \* Cleansing. Pots, pans and other objects that had become 'unclean' were cleansed by being put through fire.
- \* **Judgement.** Elijah called down fire upon the men of King Ahaziah of Samaria because he wanted to consult another god instead of Israel's God, the Lord.
- \* Love. Solomon describes love as a fire that blazes like a mighty flame.
- \* **Punishment.** Often, after taking over a city and destroying or capturing the inhabitants, an invading army would set the city on fire so there was nowhere for them to return to.
- \* Place of Reconciliation. After his resurrection, Jesus met with Peter on the beach with a fish barbecue. As they chatted, Jesus offered his forgive-ness for the three times that Peter had denied him, by asking Peter to affirm his love for Jesus and by Jesus calling him into future ministry.

and perhaps the most well known of all:

\* **Hell.** A place to be avoided at all costs. A place of eternal fire. A lake of fire. A place without Good and without God.

I hope that this Summer brings you warmth - but not so much that you think you're in hell.

#### MORE INFORMATION ABOUT THE GAS METER!

We have found that the most common reaction to our Gas Meter Replacement Appeal has been **'Why will it cost so much?'.** This is completely understandable, so what follows is by way of an explanation.



The present meter housing does not meet present day

gas safety requirements and the building is not suitable or economical for conversion. The gas meter, therefore, cannot be replaced in its present location.

The main problem is that a new gas supply can only be purchased from the National Grid (known as SMS Plc). However, an individual or a company cannot order a gas supply directly from them. The only people who can place an order are the suppliers of the gas to the property and, in the case of St Leonard's Church, this is Total Energy. Total Energy will place an order with SMS who will then organise the work to be undertaken by MKT who are the company authorised to undertake work on behalf of SMS. The MKT quotation for the work is £8,092 +VAT.

This price includes a new 63mm supply from the road, the GRP gas meter housing, a new meter and all the connections up to the meter.

However, we will then need to arrange for another Gas Safe Registered Company to bleed the pipe (empty all the gas from the pipe) which runs from the meter all the way to the boiler. When the new meter is fitted, the existing pipe must be altered to connect it to the meter outlet and again bled of all air. This will be at an extra cost of £1,300 +VAT which will include an annual boiler service and safety checks.

This situation is the same with most services (Electric, Water, Telephone) where it is not possible to obtain competitive quotes. It may be that, from a safety point of view it is good, but from a price point of view it means that they do not have to provide a competitive price. The customer can either take it or leave it.

## APPLYING FOR PERMISSION TO UNDERTAKE THE WORK TO THE DIOCESAN ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Following our Appeal, there may well be something of a delay before we are able to begin the work of replacement of the gas meter as Anglican churches have a legal system which requires everyone involved with any changes to the church to apply for the changes to be made through a 'Faculty'. These can just be advisory for small things, or through an Archdeacon's permission for larger things. Any major works need a full Faculty Application and the Parochial Church Council (PCC) will need to submit one in order to carry out the gas meter works. The process can take months or even longer before permission is granted and we are able to go ahead.

In the meantime , of course, we shall be able to continue with our Appeal. **Derek Cranage and Chris Watts - St Leonard's Fabric Committee**

#### PLATINUM JUBILEE - JUNE 4th SONGS OF PRAISE AND CELEBRATION

#### **BELL CELEBRATION WEEKEND - 11th/12th JUNE**

#### **Report by Janet Beeby - Tower Captain**

We had a very successful weekend of events to formally celebrate the end of our Bell Restoration Project. The refurbished bells were returned to the tower almost exactly three years to the day in 2019 and we have been wanting to thank everyone for their support for the fundraising since then. Obviously Covid intervened and three years on we have finally been able to do so.

Richard Bimson organised the team shown in this photo, to ring a peal on the Saturday morning. Starting just after 10am, the bells were rung continuously for 2hr 50mins in seven different methods. Four of the members of the team, including Richard and the Guild President, Sally



Brown, had rung in the previous peal on Saturday 19th January 2019 before the bells were taken down from the tower. This was Richard's first peal since lockdown and many thanks to him for organising this new peal team.



During an extended Open Church afternoon, there was a display of photographs of the whole project from the start of the fundraising campaign to the first ring on the newly installed bells. In addition, there was a display of material from the Leicestershire Diocesan Guild of

Bell Ringers highlighting bells and bell ringing. As usual, refreshments were served with tea, coffee and many delicious cakes. Thank you Mary and Geraldine and all those who helped during the afternoon. Ringers were on hand to show anyone interested the ringing room and how the bells are rung.

From 5pm there was a more formal part of the day when Graham Clifton from Whites of Appleton, Church Bell Hangers, marked the end of the Restoration Project by handing a bell rope to Rev Colin Resch. (See front cover picture of Rev Resch, Graham Clifton, Guild President Sally Brown and Janet Beeby.) Janet thanked all those who had helped during the project whether by donations or attending fundraising events, and also thanked the Guild Bell Restoration Fund for their donation of £6,000. This was the highest amount ever given to an individual project and reflected the fact that ringers had already raised £10,000 from wedding fees and weekly subscriptions before the fundraising had commenced.

Janet also thanked Marc Wainwright for his service to the church throughout 50 years of ringing at Swithland. Marc has only recently stopped ringing the 8 o'clock bell when the BCP Service was moved to monthly at 9.30am.



After Graham Clifton had handed the rope to Colin and said a

few words to symbolise the end of the restoration process, drinks & nibbles were served. It was a very convivial evening enhanced by the presence of some of the Danvers family from America who thoroughly enjoyed the whole afternoon.

The Annual Bell Ringers Service on Sunday was also Trinity Sunday. As well as ringing before the service, the bells were rung for a short time during the service by Margaret Hardwicke, Janet Beeby, Val Capewell, Guy Jibson, Suzanne and Nick Cunningham. Colin gave thanks to all who were a part of the restoration and linked the idea of Trinity Sunday with the three strands of the bell rope, symbolising the strength of things in threes. Richard Bimson read the lesson and we were pleased to sing the hymn that Jean Curd had written for bell ringers everywhere. The following is an extract from the prayers written for the service by Chris Watts:

Lord, we are reminded that one of the voices of our church are the bells, they call us to worship, they ring out for joy on a wedding day, they ring out in solemnity for funerals or days of remembrance. They must never be silent; the voice is that of the church and the bells amplify and echo it in each of us called by their sound. Lord, we thank you for our six bells, the story that they tell and for those who have been given the joy and responsibility of sounding your welcome from our tower. Grant that faith, love and devotion may be awakened in all who hear the bells through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
