Doing my duty for God and the Queen
Many years ago, just after my eighth birthday I attended my first ever Cub Scout meeting. Not long after that, I made a promise to do my best to do my duty to God and to the Queen. A promise that was repeated and renewed at my investiture as a Scout, Venture Scout, Scout Leader, and every year at the St George's day parade and at every investiture of a new Scout, Venture Scout or Scout Leader that I witnessed. As a Queen's Scout (although no longer an Active member of the Scout Association) I still try to hold to that promise. Now, following the death of her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth 1l, one element of that has come to an end.

In his sermon during the Queen's funeral, and drawing from the text of the first reading from 1 Corinthians 15 , the Archbishop of Canterbury reminded us that all things temporal must come to an end and be replaced by things eternal. My promise to do my duty to the Queen has been completed. If I were to become an active member of the Scouts once again, my promise would reference the King, but until that time, what is temporal has come to an end and I am left with the eternal - a promise to do my duty to God.

For me, doing my duty to God means doing my best to be the best disciple of Jesus Christ that I can be. To take note of his words as recorded in Scripture, his guidance, his instruction and to follow him wholeheartedly throughout my life. What does this look like? Well I guess it is best summed up in the words of Jesus when he was asked which is the greatest commandment. Jesus replied to his questioner with these words:
"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets.' (Matthew 22.37-40)

This is what following Jesus looks like for me. What does it look like for you? Why not let me know.

## All Saints

On 30th October at 9.30am we will be holding a Holy Communion Service to observe All Saintstide. The observance goes back many centuries and honours all God's saints, known or unknown, who died for their faith or who lived extraordinary lives. The protocol for ringing the bells and the lowering of the flag following the death of the Queen is set out in a document 'Operation London Bridge'.
As the death of Her Majesty was announced after 6 pm, we were required to toll the tenor bell double muffled for half and hour at midday the following day, on Friday.
The bells were double muffled by Chris Newman on Friday at 10am with Val Capewell in attendance. The bell was tolled by Guy Jibson and Graham Sharp at midday.

Following the proclamation of King Charles on Saturday morning 10th September, the bells were required to ring open i.e. not muffled. The Swithland band rang open bells for a wedding on Saturday afternoon at St Paul's, Woodhouse Eaves, fulfilling this part of the protocol. Since then the bells have been rung half-muffled for two Sunday services.

The photograph shows all the ringers who rang from 10am on the morning of the funeral, Monday 19th September. The team included Marc Wainwright our oldest ringer and Jo Wilkins, one of our learners. We rang rounds and call changes, one of which is called 'Queens'. It was wonderful to stand in the churchyard and hear the bells knowing that all over the country the bells were ringing out to celebrate the life of Her Majesty.


I am very grateful to everyone who participated in the ringing over the 10 days. Many ringers were away, including myself, when the death of Her Majesty was announced and the remaining ringers rallied together to make sure the bells were rung in accordance with the protocol laid down.

## The Lowering of the Flag

As Keeper of the Flag, Brian Beeby was also away. On Thursday evening, following the announcement of the Queen's death, the flag was lowered by Graham Sharp and David Beeby. Following the proclamation, the flag, now the Union flag courtesy of Martin Greenwood, was raised to proclaim the new King. After 24 hours the flag was lowered to half-mast by Graham. The day after the funeral, the flag was raised to the top of the flagpole.
