

God's love is for all people

For several decades, the Church of England has been exploring and debating issues around identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage. The last six years in particular have seen the Church engage in a process of listening and learning together around these issues under the heading of



Living in Love and Faith. This is a process that we have engaged with in our own parish and has given individuals the opportunity to give feedback into the debates. Generally, these issues tend to polarise views within the Church around matters of doctrine with some calling for the Church to take a fresh interpretation of the Bible that would allow us to extend the offer of marriage to those in same-sex relationships; while others are calling on the Church to uphold a traditional view of sexuality and marriage. The discussions have not been easy; and, at times, hurtful words have been spoken on both sides of the debate.

Alongside proposals to be debated at General Synod this month, the House of Bishops has now issued a direct apology to LGBTQI+ people for the way the Church has rejected them, admitting "We have not loved you as God loves you, and that is profoundly wrong." The proposals, which you can find on the Church of England website, recognise that there is still much disagreement on the way forward. For some, the proposals will go too far; yet for others, the proposals will not go far enough. I am not sure how the debate at General Synod will pan out, but there is the danger that neither side of the debate will be satisfied and the motion will fail.

Penny Mordaunt, MP, has said, "This issue (same-sex marriage) has been under discussion with the Church of England for a long time... I fear if it is not resolved at General Synod the matter will continue to fester and detract from the positive contribution the Church of England makes to our society." This is a real danger - that the focus of the Church shifts from worship and the outward looking sharing of God's love to an inward focus of argument and doctrine.

So whatever you see of the Church in the press over the coming weeks, I want to reassure you that I will continue to focus on the needs of my parishes and the sharing of God's love to ALL the people of our community. It is my hope and prayer that our Church family will do the same. Perhaps it is no coincidence that we begin February with a remembrance that Jesus Christ was presented in the temple and proclaimed to be 'salvation prepared in the sight of all people; a light for the revelation to the gentiles (non-jews) and the glory of Israel.' (See Luke 2.29-32)

Please join with me in praying for the members of General Synod who will debate these proposals on 8th February.

Lent is the period of 40 days before Easter. It starts on Ash Wednesday - this year on February 22nd - and finishes on Easter Eve, which will be on Saturday 8th April.

If you look on the calendar and count the days, you will notice that they come to more than 40. This is because we do not count Sundays.

For Christians, Lent is a time to prepare for Easter and to think about their relationship with God. It represents the 40 days when Jesus was tempted by the Devil in the desert. During this time he did not eat or drink anything and this is why some Christians give up food and fast for Lent. Some just give up luxury items such as chocolate and cream cakes!

In many churches the altar is covered with a purple cloth during Lent. Purple is traditionally a royal colour and having a purple cloth on the altar helps people to remember that Jesus is King and that he died at Easter. No other decorations or flowers appear in the church during this period.

Lent began at a time when people who were to be baptised would use Lent to prepare for their baptism on Easter Sunday. Over the years it as turned into a time of reflection for all Christians.


Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent.

The name comes from the tradition of putting a small cross of ash on people's foreheads as a sign of confession and to help them remember that they rely on God for forgiveness from their sins. It is still done in churches today.

The ash comes from the palm branches that are burned after the Palm Sunday Church services of the previous year.

LEICESTER CATHEDRAL REVEALED

The Leicester Cathedral Revealed Project is restoring and renewing the the Cathedral so it can be its very best as a place of worship, heritage

pilgrimage, hospitality, learning, sanctuary and celebration.

The existing cathedral building is being transformed with a new stone floor, level throughout and including energy-efficient underfloor heating; replacement of failing infrastructure such as boilers and the electrical system; installation of new lighting and AV; restoration of key architectural features and repair of much that has deteriorated, particularly stonework and décor.

The project is also creating a distinct new extension to the Cathedral - a visitor and learning centre to be known as The Chapter House - on the footprint of the former 1930s Song School, thereby preserving the open space of Cathedral Gardens. It will have a confident contemporary appear-



ance and provide a new orientation/exhibition gallery, hospitality and learning spaces, WCs, offices and storage.



Good progress is being made. External stonework repair and restoration has been completed on the south façade, including installing four striking new grotesques high up on the parapet wall. Inside the Cathedral a limestone floor slab has been laid to create a breathable

base for the new limestone floor. Internal scaffolding is in place and high-level works for the new lighting and redecoration are advancing

Archaeological excavations have been undertaken and these have revealed fascinating information and insights into the lives of those who lived in Leicester over past centuries. With archaeology complete, construction of the basement for the new Chapter House can get underway.

Significant cost overruns are being encountered in a number of key areas including archaeology and asbestos removal, putting additional demands on what was always going to be a challenging project.

It is hoped to re-open the Cathedral in the Autumn of 2023 and then the new Chapter House in the Spring of 2024.
