#### Is Commitment a dirty word?

In an age when we often do not think twice about signing an 18-24 month 'phone contract, why is it that membership of clubs and associations is at an all time low? Has commitment become something of a dirty word?

We are happy to sign up to something - even make a substantial regular financial commitment - if we can see how it will benefit us (such as a new 'phone contract). Maybe in our parents' or grandparents' generation they were signing up to commit to a cause - such as a community club, union or sports association - knowing that their financial contribution would assist that cause or charity; but in our generation we often make our financial contribution, asking the question, "what will I get in return?" Times are tough and we want to make the most of our hard-earned cash.

Many clubs and charities (local church included) have not been very good at communicating the benefits of their 'cause' and, as a result, have lost membership and the benefits that come from members' time, talents and money.

It is that time of year when we revise our Church membership list (known as the Church Electoral Roll). The names of those who have died are removed along with those who have moved away: new congregants and parishioners are invited to join. Will your name be on the list? What is the point, why bother? What does the Church offer in return?

I'm not sure that I can summarise the 'cause' of the Church in just a few paragraphs - it is much too complex for that: but I will draw your attention to two scriptures and encourage you to prayerfully dwell upon them to see if they give an explanation:

- "God demonstrates his own love for us in this: while we were still sinners, Christ died for us". (Romans 5.8)
- Jesus said, "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full." (John 10.10)

That is reason enough for me to commit, but what about you?

#### DAFFODILS

As snowdrops start to fade, their place is taken by daffodils, symbolizing rebirth and new beginnings, announcing the beginning of spring and signifying the end of the cold dark days.

Daffodils are common flowers seen at Easter. Not only are they seasonal, but as symbols of revival and rebirth Christians associate them with the resurrection of Jesus.

The scientific name of daffodils is "narcissus" a name which is linked to the youth of that name who fell in love with his own reflection. It is a spring flowering perennial of the amaryllis family, and the various common names include daffodil, narcissus and jonquil. It is the national flower of Wales and is associated with St David's Day, March 1st.

The name "daffodil" is derived from affodell, a variant of asphodel. An alternative name is the **lent lily**, and is referred to as such in A.E. Houseman's "A Shropshire Lad". Many commentators believe the daffodil to be the flower that Solomon referred to as "the lily of the valley".

Among the English romantic writers, no reference is better known than William Wordsworth's 1804 poem:

I wandered lonely as a cloud
That floats on high o'er vales and hills,
When all at once I saw a crowd,
A host of golden daffodils;
Beside the lake, beneath the trees,
Fluttering and dancing in the breeze.

Isiah in chapter 35 speaks of the hope and optimism represented by these beautiful flowers (sometimes translated as crocuses): "The desert and the parched land will be glad: the wilderness will rejoice and blossom".

Finally, Jesus in his sermon on the mount, encouraging his followers not to worry about their worldly needs, has this to say:

"Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they toil not, neither do they spin; yet I say unto you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these".

#### MOTHERING SUNDAY SERVICE AT 9.30am on 19th MARCH



Mothering Sunday is the fourth Sunday in Lent. Although it is often called Mother's Day it has no connection with the American festival of that name.

Traditionally, it was a day when children, mainly daughters who had gone to work as domestic servants, were given the day off to visit their mother and family. Today it is still a day when children give presents, flowers and cards to their mothers.

Most Sundays in the year churchgoers in England worship at their nearest parish church. Centuries ago it was considered important for people to return to their home or 'mother' church once a year and so each year, in the middle of Lent, everyone would visit their 'mother' church - the main church or cathedral of the area.

Inevitably, the return to the 'mother' church became an occasion for family reunions. It was quite common in those days for children to leave home for work when they were 10 years old. As they walked home along the country lanes they would pick wild flowers or violets to take to church or to give to their mother as a small gift.

At St Leonard's Church we continue this tradition of giving flowers and take pleasure in distributing flowering plants for everyone who comes along to the service to take to their mother or someone they love. We hope you will be able to come along to collect yours.
