Are you ready for a break?

Now that Summer has truly arrived, many of us will be preparing for our holidays. We will take time out of our normal, busy schedules to do something a little different. Some of you will be looking for active

holidays enjoying long walks, cycling, swimming and other sports; some will be looking for a new cultural experience with the opportunity to explore somewhere you've never been before, eating foods you've never heard of; others will be looking for a place of rest and sanctuary with the opportunity to sleep-in or lie in the sun. Whatever you are looking for, and it might just be a mix of all of the above, I hope it brings refreshment and relaxation.

Ever since the beginning of time, right back at the beginning of our Bible, when God created the world, we see that the cycle of work and rest was built into the rhythm of life. God created for six days and then rested for one. This one day in the seven for resting was enshrined in Jewish law and culture as 'Sabbath'. There were strict consequences for breaking the Sabbath and those that did so were to be cut off from the rest of the people.

God knows that we need rest. It is not good for us to work day after day, week after week with no opportunity for rest. Occasionally I meet people (usually those running their own business, but sometimes my clergy colleagues) who just don't seem to know how to stop - in fact it almost becomes a badge of honour "I have worked every day for three years, and it hasn't done me any harm." And yet, there is ample scientific and anecdotal evidence that resting is vital to our mental and physical health. It benefits our immune system, stress management, mood, decision making, creativity and work productivity.

Jesus says, "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11.28). I hope that over the next few weeks, you may be able to spend some time resting either by yourself or with your family; laying your work phone to one side and enjoying a little down time. You've worked hard, now take some time to rest.



ST SWITHUN (or Swithin) -Saint for a rainy day - 15th July

St Swithun is apparently the saint you can blame for rainy summers. It is said that if it rains on his special day, 15th July, it will then rain for 40 days afterwards. It all began when Swithun was made Bishop of Winchester in 852 by King Ethelwulf of Wessex. It was an



important posting as Winchester was the capital of Wessex and during the 10 years Swithun was there, Wessex became the most important kingdom of England.

During his life, instead of washing out people's summer holidays and damping down their spirits, Swithun seems to have done a lot of good. He was famous for his charitable gifts and for his energy in getting churches built. When he was dying in 862, he asked that he be buried in the cemetery of the Old Minster, just outside the west door.

If he had been left there in peace who knows how many rainy summers the English may have been spared over the last 1000years. But, no, it was decided to move Swithun. By now, the 960's, Winchester had become the first monastic cathedral chapter in England and the newly installed monks wanted Swithun in the cathedral with them. Finally, on 15th July 971, his bones were dug up and Swithun was transferred to the cathedral.

That same day many people claimed to have had miraculous cures. Certainly everyone got wet, for the heavens opened. The unusually heavy rain that day, and on the days following, was attributed to the power of St Swithun. Swithun was moved again in 1093, into the new Winchester Cathedral. His shrine was a popular place of pilgrimage throughout the middle ages. It was destroyed during the Reformation and restored in 1962. There are 58 ancient dedications to Swithun in England.



Readers of The LINK will be aware that every September St Leonard's Church participates in Ride and Stride and has raised a significant amount of money for the Leicestershire Historic Churches Trust over the years.

Half of the monies raised each year by our church are given back to St Leonard's towards the running costs of the church. This year again the PCC has decided that this money will be given to the much needed, on going new gas meter fund. The meter is in urgent need of replacement in order to ensure the plentiful and safe supply of gas to the church.

We hope that you think this is a worthwhile cause to support and can be encouraged to take part in Ride and Stride this year on **Saturday 9th September.**

As well as taking part, please spread the word and encourage friends also to take part and enjoy a day that is a fun day as well as beneficial to the Leicestershire Historic Churches Trust and St Leonard's Church. You can either cycle, walk or drive from church to church making your own route. There will be many beautiful churches open throughout the county certainly worth visiting, some that are not usually open to the public. Remember, the more people you can get to sponsor you on the number of churches you visit, the more money we can raise.

Hazel Byford very kindly agreed to be the second person in our budding series of local people with longstanding connections to St Leonard's Church. I am sure you will enjoy reading the following which touches on just a part of her very interesting life. Editor

HAZEL BYFORD

Through her marriage to Barrie Byford, Hazel's connections to St Leonard's Church can be traced back for four generations. Living in Thurcaston and unhappy with the Rector there, Barrie's parents along with their children, began to attend services at St Leonard's in the

1930's and, as the adjacent photo shows, on June 3rd this year, three generations of the family were very happily able to gather together to celebrate the wedding of Hazel and Barrie's granddaughter, Stephanie. However, this bring us up to date rather too quickly, so we shall begin again.



Hazel, known to many of us as Pixie (a derivative of Pickles from when she was a child and seemed always to be 'in a pickle'), was born in Rothley and was baptised at St Mary's Church. Along with her siblings she attended the Sunday School there under the guidance of Mrs Ruth Packe, and she would accompany her father to Matins every Sunday - a non-negotiable, compulsory arrangement Hazel recalls - and, as a teenager she attended Evensong with her mother. The services at this time were led by Reverend Hunting. Hazel was confirmed whilst attending school in Scotland.

In 1962 she married Barrie Byford at Rothley Church and from then until 1977, whilst living in Quorn, they worshipped at St Bartholomew's, Quorn, and Barrie became a member of the Parochial Church Council. Returning to Rothley in 1977, Hazel preferred to worship at a smaller church and began attending the services at St Leonard's. Barrie joined her later and went on to become the treasurer of St Leonard's Parochial Church Council for many years.

Hazel grew up with politics always being an important part of her life her father, Sir Cyril Osborne, was an MP - and her interest, dedication and achievements in this area eventually led, in 1996, to her becoming a working Peer in the House of Lords where she served for 24years and was Shadow DEFRA Minister for 10years. Asked "how do you balance your religious beliefs with your work?" Hazel will answer that they are inseparable, they always go together.

Accepting an invitation from Bishop Tim Stevens to become a Lay Canon of Leicester Cathedral, Hazel undertook this role for 20years during which time she was Chairman of the Cathedral Council for 10years. Becoming Licensed as a Server at the Cathedral was a natural progression and in addition she became a relief Server at St Leonard's - a role which she still fulfils today.

Now a year long member of the Thurcaston Church Handbell Ringing Group and thoroughly enjoying taking part in their local performances, Hazel confirms that "you never know where life in the church will take you" and that her faith and connections to St Leonard's continue to be a most important part of her life.
