What makes a strong team?

If you are the sort of person who switches off at the first mention of football, please skip over the next paragraph. If you don't like mixed metaphors, this whole page will probably annoy you - please accept my apology now.



This year's football summer transfer window ran from 14th June to 1st September. While most of us were concerned with getting a few days holiday, players, lawyers, coaches, managers, boards were working hard to get the best deal possible. Some 750 players withing the Championship and Premier Leagues transferred in this period at fees ranging anything from zero to an obscene £105m for Declan Rice moving from West Ham United to Arsenal.

You don't have to be a sports fan to know that a good player on the team makes all the difference to your chances of success. But a good team is more than just the individual players. A good team includes everyone from the players, coaches and managers to the back-room support staff and even the fans. But why, when I really don't care that much for football, am I talking about this now? Because I think, if I stretch the analogy, there are parallels between a sports team and the Church of England. Here's just a couple:

- 1) The whole Church is only the whole Church when every member does their part. St Paul uses the analogy of a body in 1 Corinthians 12.12-27 "The body is not made up of one part but of many ... you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it."
- 2) We work together so that the strong support the weak. A good team will often see stronger members carrying others in their time of weakness. The Church of England does this through its parish, benefice, deanery and diocesan structures and the pooling of shared resources.

Our Church has now been invited to join local conversations with other churches in this area to see how we might work better together in structures that the Diocese of Leicester is calling Minster Communities. This is an exciting time for us and some of the suggested changes to how we work may lead to increased levels of concern and anxiety for some; but working together is a God idea. God lives in Trinity as Father, Son and Holy Spirit. I would suggest that when we work together we form a stronger, better team. If you can, join the conversation, pray and watch this space for future developments.

THE MUSIC OF JOHN IRELAND AND THE LOVE OF JESUS CHRIST

When asked about his hobbies and interests, the American satirical singer-songwriter and Harvard maths professor, Tom Lehrer, replied "lying down". Since he is now 95 years old this has clearly held him in good stead! As well as the physical benefits of rest and sleep, they are known to improve cognitive ability and mood and help us to think more clearly. I often get ideas for the subject and content of an article when lying in bed, and I know at least one preacher who finds inspiration doing the same. So here is one of my offerings.

John Ireland (1879-1962) was an English classical music composer and teacher. He taught at the Royal College of Music from 1923 and his students included Benjamin Britten. The majority of his output consists of piano miniatures and songs, though he also composed short orchestral works. His best-known piece is the nativity carol "The Holy Boy". He also wrote hymns and anthems. Many of you will know that most beautiful of hymns "Love unknown", composed by Ireland to words by Samuel Crossman (1624-84). Verses 1 and 7 illustrate the love which Jesus Christ has for us.

My song is love unknown, my saviour's love to me, Love to the loveless shown that they might lovely be, Oh who am I, that for my sake, My Lord should take frail flesh and die.

Here might I stay and sing no story so divine, Never was love, dear King, never was grief like thine! This is my friend in whose sweet praise I all my days could gladly spend.

He composed the anthem "Greater love hath no man", a motet for Passiontide, to a patchwork of verses from the old and new testaments, starting with the Song of Solomon, 8.6-7:

Many waters cannot quench love, neither can the floods drown it.

The really important part comes from the words of Jesus in the gospel of John, 15.12-14:

Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends.

Jesus did exactly that and laid down his life for his friends, and for us, people he never knew. We are imperfect people, yet Jesus assured us that it is possible to love each other perfectly when he commanded us to love one another as he has loved us. What a wonderful message this is!

I had thought it would be difficult to find anyone with a longer association to St Leonard's Church than last month's interviewee, Olga Harris, but in fact our Churchwarden, Sally Allen's number of years of worship proved to be very similar indeed. Editor.

SALLY ALLEN

Sally's parents, John and Joan Copson, were married at St Mary's Church, Rothey, in 1939, and they lived at Hollycroft Farm, Main Street, Swithland. Sally lived at home into her adulthood along with her two elder sisters, Rosemarie and Cynthia and two younger brothers, Roger and Nigel. As with so many people from large families Sally remarks that she can't remember where everyone slept but that the bathroomless house never seemed overcrowded even when hosting an evacuee during the war.

Home was in fact a small dairy farm with Sally's father both selling and delivering milk, cream and butter. It was part of the Lanesborough Estates until 1954 when it was sold and given the number 104 Main Street.

Sally was baptised at St Leonard's in 1943 and has been part of the church congregation ever since. She attended the village school from 1948 with teachers Miss Dixon and Miss Oldham until she was 11 years old when she transferred to South Charnwood School, Markfield, travelling there daily on the school bus.

Sally remembers attending a very active Sunday School held in church at 2.30pm. This meant that on Sundays she attended church three times - 11am, 2.30pm and 6.30pm. Beatrice Bunney and Dorothy Rudkin were the Sunday School teachers and they organised outings, an annual party and Festival each year for which new dresses and bouquets of flowers were the order of the day - see photo of Sally, Cynthia and Rosemarie.

Growing up, Sally joined the choir, rang the church bells, took part in the annual carol singing and Bluebell Services and remembers Harvest Festivals when all the fresh produce was donated to the Roecliffe Manor Children's Home. She was confirmed along with 37(!) others both young and old by Rev'd Cecil Harcourt in December 1955. The reason for this huge number of confirmations was because until 1955 and the advent of Rev'd Harcourt, St Leonard's had been in interregnum and without a vicar since 1939.

The new vicar, together with Mr & Mrs Ernest Gamble, missionaries who lived at the Rectory, brought new life into the village. A Friday night Youth Club which drew youngsters from Cropston, Thurcaston and Woodhouse Eaves, was organised. Regular Saturday night dances were held in the Memorial Hall, weekly Whist Drives took place and Fur & Feather events were held at Christmas. One of the visiting young men at the Youth Club was Christopher Allen.

Many a romance began at the village get togethers including Sally's own with Chris, who she went on to marry at St Leonard's Church in 1964. Continuing to worship each week, their two children, Rachael and Charles, were duly baptised and attended Sunday School. Sally became secretary of the Parochial Church Council for many years, a leader of the Mother's Union and then, upon the retirement of Gwen Gimson in 2008, took on the role of Churchwarden which she still holds today.
