

ONE PIECE AT A TIME

Many of you will be aware that I am quite a fan of jigsaws at least there are certain types of jigsaws that I enjoy. I quite enjoy the WASGIJ series of puzzles where what you see on the

box is not quite the same as what you will see in the finished picture. I also enjoy puzzles where the finished puzzle creates a beautiful picture. It is a joy to see the picture come into being one piece at a time.

I use jigsaw puzzles as a means of relaxation. While I am trying to fit the pieces together I can lay aside the concerns and stresses of the day. One of my favourite gifts was a portable jigsaw board which allows me to pack up the puzzle part way through and continue it on another occasion. This came about after finding a jigsaw in a holiday cottage I once stayed in, then realising part way through that I might not finish it in time before I had to go home. The level of stress I experienced undid any of the gain - it was certainly not a relaxing experience. For the same reasons, I am not a fan of ridiculously difficult puzzles either such as the picture of baked beans I was once given - I mean, what is the point!?

As we journey together in our Bible Readings (see separate leaflet Fifteen Minutes a Day) we gradually experience more of God's salvation plan. Slowly, bit by bit, piece by piece, we make connections between the Old Testament and the New, between the promises of God made to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob and the coming of Jesus as a Saviour for the world. When we re-read our Bibles in this way, we can take the connections made in one year and join them with the connections we make in previous years; and slowly, sometimes very slowly, gradually, bit by bit, piece by piece, the entire story of God's love for us is revealed until we can finally step back and take a look at the finished picture.

In one sense, we will never see the finished picture until we have finished our journey through this life; but then, as we look back, we will see the most beautiful picture of God's love reflected in every one of the trials and tribulations, the joys and celebrations of our life. What an amazing picture that will be.

So "...do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear...But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." (Matthew 6.25,33) With every blessing, Colin Resch

The Season of Lent

The first day of Lent in the Christian calendar begins on Ash Wednesday and this year the date will be February 14th - a date we know much better these days as St Valentine's Day.

The day prior to this is known as Shrove Tuesday when traditionally all flour, eggs and fat are used up in the form of pancakes ready for the Lent fast.

The 40 day period of Lent finishes on Easter Eve and we then celebrate Easter Day on Sunday March 31st.

Now 99years old and living for the last 3 years at Rose Cottage in Mountsorrel, Pat Copson was the oldest member of our congregation. Here she shares memories of her life with us and how she came to be so much a part of St Leonard's Church. Editor



Pat was born in Rotherhithe, a part of London now known as Surrey Quays. The youngest by 10years of 4 siblings, her father was a solicitor who tragically died when she was only 6years old However, Pat remembers a happy childhood with the family worshipping at St Katherine's Church in Rotherhithe - a church which no longer exists as it was bombed during the London Blitz. An annual birthday treat was a visit to the London Palladium with her cousins to see popular performers such as the Crazy Gang.

After primary school Pat was educated at The Guild of Haberdashers School which dates back to medieval times and is still open today and this involved travelling from her home for one stop on the 'tube'. Pat remembers exploring the streets of London with her friends quite freely in those days - something we can only marvel at today but then, just a normal part of everyday life.

On reaching her teens, the advent of war with Germany loomed large and in 1939 - the year later known as the phoney war period - the government decided to evacuate children from London. Pat was sent first to Brighton and later to Devon. On both occasions, in common with all other parents, Pat's mother had no idea where she was until she received a postcard from her a few days after her arrival. During the war one of Pat's brothers joined the RAF and served in the Middle East and the other joined the Royal Navy and was involved in the battle of the Bismark in the Atlantic. Returning to London in 1940, Pat has vivid memories of the London Blitz in the September of that year when her home was bombed out and all the family's worldly possessions were lost - in particular she remembers losing a pair of new tennis shoes and, of more concern to her mother, a whole leg of lamb!

Fortunately, Pat's mother was able to take up the offer of a lifelong friend, Mrs Wright nee Pegg, to stay with her family in Mountsorrel. In due course, Pat, her mother and her sister, moved into rented accommodation in Mountsorrel - an old house with no plumbing and only pumps to provide water. During the war Pat worked in the offices at the Auster Aircraft Company in Mountsorrel who repaired Hurricane fighter planes, and recalls calculating the bonuses for the employees on a slide rule. Now a young woman, Pat enjoyed as much of the social life that was possible in the war years and met her future husband, Les Copson, at a dance at the Mountsorrel Working Men's Club, an institution which is still there to this day. Marriage followed in 1946 at Christ Church and the life of a farmer's wife began at Brickyard Farm, Swithland Lane, Rothley, including attendance at St Leonard's Church. After the tragic death of their 6year old daughter, Jane, Les was also able to find solace and hope at St Leonard's and was baptised there and later confirmed along with Pat in 1955. Interestingly, Les chose Gwen Gimson, St Leonard's longest serving churchwarden, to be his godmother.

During the years which followed Pat was always a very active member of the church congregation including being secretary of the Mothers' Union for 14years, writing the intercessions into her 90's and serving on the Parochial Church Council. She remembers when the Men's Club helped to lay the Memorial Hall floor and the many Harvest Suppers held there. Church Wives' meetings were at the home of Gwen Gimson where, on one occasion, the guest speakers were from Leicester City Football Club. She also enjoyed many delightful suppers hosted by the Earl of Lanesborough at his home following the Temple Estates and Lanesborough shoots.

Pat and Les moved to The Green, Mountsorrel in 1984 following Les being taken ill in 1977. The farm was sold when they left and a house built at the side in a part of the large garden. Pat nursed Les for 23years and then in 2012 she moved to the Hind Sisters' cottages in Cropston. During all this time Pat often travelled back to London and on many occasions visited the ballet where she was lucky enough to see Margot Fonteyn and Rudolph Nureyev dance together. Come rain or shine she attended St Leonard's each Sunday until her own ill health resulted in her move to Rose Cottage. She remains lively and interested in all that happens at St Leonard's through reading The LINK and visits from friends and sends her good wishes to everyone she knows for a joyful and prosperous New Year.

At a recent meeting of St Leonard's Parochial Church Council it was agreed for St Leonard's Church to be open every Saturday between 10am and 4pm to enable visitors and passers by to call in. The first Saturday opening will be on 3rd February.


